On the early morning of March 9th, 2016, there was a solar eclipse that was visible in southern Asia. Singapore, Northern Australia, and Hawaii could see a partial eclipse, but Indonesia got the best view, being able to see the sun blocked out in totality. It was first seen around 6:20 AM local time in Jakarta, the capital of Indonesia. Citizens of the nation's capital made their way as quickly as possible to the city's planetarium in order to view the eclipse as clearly and safely as possible. The next total solar eclipse will occur on August 21, 2017, in a narrow path of the United States.

New photos taken by the New Horizons team at NASA have shown a chain of mountains on Pluto. Although these photos were taken during the 2015 Pluto fly-by, they were released on March 3rd after being analyzed. These "mountains" are actually huge water ice formations capped with methane snow, similar to icebergs on Earth. These hills float in a Nitrogen sea that sits on the surface of the stranger-than-originally-thought planet. In fact, these new photos suggest that there is much more water-ice on Pluto than originally thought, which is a very exciting thing to discover.

About a month ago, a famous theory was proven right - Einstein's theory of relativity! Scientists at LIGO (the Laser Interferometer Gravitational-Wave Observatory) discovered evidence of gravitational waves, which are ripples in space-time, proving that time is relative. The detected gravitational waves were created by two massive black holes merging together around 1.3 billion years ago. The sound of these two black holes colliding was a 1/15 of a second "chirp". Einstein proposed the concept of "spacetime" in 1915, and until now, there hasn't been a cosmic event massive enough to detect that it exists. Now we finally get to see the theory of relativity confirmed. Congratulations Einstein!

What's New in STEM?



For quite some time, experts have predicted that science is the only vehicle for progress in the world, and here at R-K, the science department is evolving to match the advances being made. R-K strives to prepare girls to enter the ever-changing, fast-paced world. In this past year, the R-K science department has been preparing to implement some new changes in the coming years while continuing to educate girls to the highest capacity.

Rosati's science classes are in full swing. Freshmen are learning about force in Integrated Chemistry and Physics. In biology, sophomores are studying cell division. Juniors in Chemistry are learning about ionic and covalent bonds. Students in AP Biology recently traveled to Chicago and are currently studying ecology along with preparation for the AP test. Eco-Act students are teaching lessons on the environment to gradeschool students. In Anatomy, girls are learning about the brain and nervous system, and physics students are studying electricity.

The robotics team, SistaMatik, recently competed as the only all-girls robotics team at the regional robotics competition held at the Chaifetz Arena on March 11 and 12. Of 49 teams, they were awarded with first place in defense, eighth place in offensive power rating, and the prestigious Judges' Award. They had the highest scoring game with 145

points. Annie Hilker '17, also won the Dean's List Award, and will also go on to compete further.

The Science National Honor Society has been active as well, dissecting owl pellets, touring Millipore Sigma's facilities, and participating in a TrashBash to pick up litter around the Mississippi River.

The coming years will bring many changes for science at Rosati. Next school year, the science department plans on expanding current classes. A.C.C. Physics has a large enrollment for the next year. Mrs. Lester, the physics teacher and robotics moderator of R-K, says, "I'm really excited about the future. We're getting a variety of students with a variety of interests."

Another new project for the science department is the addition of AP Chemistry next year. Both students and faculty feel the excitement that comes with the new addition. When asked about her thoughts on the new class, Mrs. Daues said that she was "excited and a little frightened, but mostly excited," and Michelle Ferkel '17 says, "I like that there is a bigger variety of classes."

Overall, there are many exciting science-related activities happening around Rosati-Kain. With the amount of new opportunities and improvements to come, the future is bright for STEM at R-K.

Blast From the Past: Q-K Uniforms Over the Years



Rosati-Kain has a long history, and a lot has changed over its 100 years. While much remains the same – Rosati's values, city location, and personality – one of the most visible changes is in the uniform worn by R-K girls since the school's founding.

When R-K began in 1912, girls had no uniform or dress code. Simple dresses were worn in the style of the day, frequently with large hairbows, sailor-style ties, and lace-up boots. The requirement of a uniform began in 1915, when girls had to wear a middy blouse (a shirt similar to those worn by sailors) secured with a scarf-style tie. The blouse was worn with a navy skirt and hated by the girls, who were bitter about changing from their own clothes to the plain uniform ensembles.

As times changed, so did fashion, and Rosati's uniforms morphed to fit the style of the times. In the 1920s, hems grew shorter and petal-collar blouses were adopted along with bobbed hair. During this time a system of ties was created: the color red was designated for freshmen, light blue for sophomores, dark blue for juniors, and black for seniors. In 1924, R-K introduced gym classes, and the girls' gym uniforms were bloomers with a smock top. During the 1930s the gym

uniform changed to green jumpers. In the 1940s the girls wore Peter Pan-collar blouses with knee-length, fitted skirts.



This decade marked a change in the colors of the ties: green for "freshies," red for sophomores, light blue for juniors, and coveted black for seniors. These ties were strips of satin or velvet secured to the collar of every girl's school blouse with a straight pin. Girls endured the pins but upon their exit from the school building, girls removed their ties and stuffed them into their purses. After all, girls who took the bus did not want the McBride boys to know that they were only lowly underclassmen. The tradition of removing ties excluded seniors, who had suffered for three years to obtain their black ties and therefore kept them on as long as possible.

In the 1950s skirts became longer and looser, and girls sometimes wore high heels to school. More popular shoe options included brogues, saddle shoes, and penny loafers, while sneaker remained a "must" for gym class. Letter sweaters adorned with medals and pins were in fashion along with oxford blouses. Girls continued to wear white and navy into the 1960s.



In 1970 the tradition of ties was abolished, and in 1973 the enforced uniform was removed from Rosati. A dress code was installed that allowed students to wear any navy skirt or pants with any shirt, provided that the shirt had a collar. In the 1980s girls liked to accessorize with layered sweaters the popular "preppy" style of the time. Some students just wore polos and sweatshirts, but sweatshirts from other high school were forbidden. The 1990s was a continuation of this dress code with the addition of khaki bottoms.

The year 2003 marked a very important change to the R-K uniform – the inclusion of the plaid skirt and polo combination. The skirt's introduction was spearheaded by students and was slightly controversial, as girls worried that it would rob students of their individuality. The plaid skirt remains the most popular uniform option around school.
