#ItcanWait

Randall Stephenson, Chairman, and CEO of AT&T, once told Cathy Coughlin '75, Senior Executive Vice President

and Global Marketing Officer, "I want you to think about the AT&T brand as if it were my 13-year-old daughter. I'm trusting you to protect her reputation." And that is exactly what Cathy did. She loved what she did, and she took her job and AT&T personally. Such was her concern that she was deeply affected when parents began contacting AT&T asking for help after their son or daughter was killed

in a texting and driving accident. Cathy knew technology was wonderful, but used in the wrong way could be dangerous. She was determined to get that word out and force a change. That word came in the form of a new AT&T campaign she developed in 2010 called 'It Can Wait.'

This nationwide campaign encouraged customers, businesses, and young people to spread the word and take the pledge: Never Text and Drive. At a time when cell phone providers were in steep competition with each other, Cathy was able to convince Sprint Corp., T-Mobile US Inc., and Verizon Communications Inc. to work together to make a difference. "We are the fiercest competitors," Cathy once said, "but this is one of those issues where everybody says, we have a responsibility here."

Although Cathy passed away in 2015, her legacy at Rosati-Kain continues as our students gathered for the first-ever #ltCanWait all-school assembly on March 10th. In coordination with AT&T representatives Ryan Luckey, AVP, Corporate Brand Marketing from the Dallas office and Jomo Castro, Area Manager, External Affairs from the St. Louis office, students were able to hear the stories of the lives affected by driving distracted. Mr. Castro shared this frightening statistic with our students and staff, "Sending or reading a text takes your eyes off the road for 4.6 seconds. At 55 mph, that's like driving the length of an entire football field...blindfolded."

One of the most moving moments of the presentation was hearing from Cathy directly, with the help of video from the launching of this program in 2010. In the video, Cathy takes the pledge to never text and drive, and says, "I'm taking this pledge for my 10 nieces and nephews, four of whom are driving."

Joining the presentation was Cathy's sister, Mary Schillinger and her family. Mary spoke to the students about Cathy's life and legacy and her love of R-K. "I need a favor from all of you in this room. I need you to help me get Cathy's message out. After today's presentation, I'm asking each of you to take the It Can Wait pledge and say you will not text/post/type on your phone while driving. Secondly, I need you to get on social media and help spread the message – put your phone down while driving – #ItCanWait. I want our message to go viral. Will you do those two things for me and keep my sister's mission alive? We can save lives today."

Representatives from St. Mary's High School were also in attendance. Laretta Divis, counselor at St. Mary's High

School was excited to be a part of this presentation. "The message of #ItCanWait seems to be something simple to communicate to our students. Many times the simple messages get pushed to the side because students, families, and school staff get busy with so many other things. I was grateful to Rosati-Kain for inviting St.

Mary's to participate because this "simple" message can save lives."

Our hope is that everyone can take Cathy's message back to their families and friends and help spread the word – **Never Drive Distracted**.

R-KRESILENCE

In early October of 1918, a second wave of the deadly Spanish Flu hit St. Louis and the City Health Commissioner Dr. Max Starkloff ordered the closure of schools, movie theatres, sporting events, and other public gathering places. Rosati-Kain High School closed for nearly two months during that pandemic.

Catherine Schario Maher, Class of 1920, a freshman at R-K during the Spanish Flu, left a handwritten note to her family recounting these days. Catherine wrote that when Rosati-Kain High School closed she went downtown with a friend, Rose Sherman to find jobs. She finally found one at Myles Millinery Shoppe for \$2 a week making hats. She didn't know how to sew at first, but quickly learned. She even had an order from Amelia Earhardt for a \$20 lined hat, which was tremendously expensive at the time. She knew Amelia Earhardt was an aviator, but didn't really know what that was, but the hat was beautiful. After two months, she went back to Rosati-Kain and brought with her a few skills she learned for sewing class.

During World War II, in 1943, every American contributed to the war efforts, including Rosati-Kain students. "War Shortages In Place" meant the following materials were being rationed in order to keep both civilian and Armed Forces going: food, shoes, metal, and rubber. R-K students gave up all clubs and dances that year, and for the Class of 1943, the students had no yearbook or prom. The most they received was a one page class day program. Although it was disappointing, the students knew lives were at stake and the Class of 1943 led the charge in supporting the war efforts by collecting stamps, war bonds, and scrap metal, and taking on more responsibilities at home on top of school. At this time, many women entered the workforce to keep the U.S going while a good portion of our male population had left their jobs to go fight the war. Looking back over the years between 1942-1945, Rosati-Kain archivist, Jen Shephard Guidici '87, found that the students rose to the challenge, and did their part with both sacrifices and extra responsibilities.

In March of 2020, our country experienced another crisis – the pandemic COVID-19 or Coronavirus. While

our students were enjoying spring break, we received word that all Archdiocesan schools had to close to help combat the spread of this deadly disease. There were more questions than answers, but Rosati-Kain accepted the challenge and quickly moved into an E-learning environment for our students, faculty, and staff. With just a few days notice, teachers were able to transition their lesson plans to work in this new 'virtual' school. Students, especially the Class of 2020, were left with so many questions about school activities and special events coming up in the next two months. But even as the anxiety of the unknown plagued their minds, our students continue to rise above. Our R-K community rallied quickly to help and support each other and the St. Louis Community.

Our Campus Minister, Erin Brennan, made it a point to connect with all of our students through daily Instagram posts and weekly live "MinisTea Moments." Our Director of Wellness, Mary Wald, sent out emails with resources for parents and students as the pressure of being quarantined for multiple weeks began to build. Our President, Dr. Elizabeth Ann Goodwin, assured us through daily prayer that this too shall pass.

As our administration works tirelessly to navigate these difficult times, and works to reschedule some of these milestone moments, we rely on each other to remind us that while we may miss a few of the traditions we see each year, we hold in our hearts something more, something bigger than all of us. Together, we are finding ways to connect to our students, to connect to our alumnae, and to connect to our community. We are slowing down a bit, sitting down to eat dinner together, and even playing board games together. We are checking on our neighbors and supporting our favorite local restaurants by ordering curbside. And we are praying together. So while we may be physically separated from each other, we are learning new ways to be together even while we are apart.

This may not be how we envisioned the end to the 2019-20 school year, but once again, Rosati-Kain High School will rise to the occasion and be stronger because of it.
